## Paperback Row

WEALTH AND POWER: China's Long March to the Twenty-First Century, by Orville Schell and John Delury. (Random House, \$17.) Many countries revel in their victories, but China is driven by the humiliations it has suffered at the hands of foreigners over the past two centuries. Through 11 biographical sketches of Chinese intellectuals and political leaders — Wei Yuan, Sun Yat-sen, Deng Xiaoping — Schell and Delury trace the cultural origins of the country's ascent from imperial doormat to global economic powerhouse.

**RETURN TO OAKPINE,** by Ron Carlson. (Penguin, \$16.) Four men, high school friends who grew up in 1960s Wyoming and played together in a garage band, reunite 30 years later in Carlson's bighearted novel. They're ready to rehash the events that drove them apart, and to celebrate — and regret — the crooked paths they've taken since.

**THE BROTHERS: John Foster Dulles, Allen Dulles, and Their Secret World War,** by Stephen Kinzer. (St. Martin's Griffin, \$17.99.) John Foster Dulles served as secretary of state from 1953 to 1959; Allen Dulles ran the C.I.A. from 1953 to 1961. Kinzer's riveting book shows how these two immensely

powerful brothers directed a Manichaean foreign policy during the height of the Cold War, eliminating "inconvenient" regimes and relentlessly prioritizing American corporate interests.

**THE DIVORCE PAPERS,** by Susan Rieger. (Broadway, \$15.) In Rieger's modern twist on the epistolary novel, Sophie Diehl, a 29-year-old attorney with no experience in divorce law, is compelled to take the high-society case of Maria Durkheim, whose 16-year marriage is ending. As the story unfolds through emails, office memos and legal papers, "Rieger excavates the humor and humanity from a most bitter uncoupling," Emily Giffin said here.

FIVE BILLION YEARS OF SOLITUDE: The Search for Life Among the Stars, by Lee Billings. (Current, \$17.) "Life on this planet has an expiration date," Billings writes in this history of the hunt for other Earthlike worlds, "if for no other reason than that someday the sun will cease to shine." But his wideranging account is less about exoplanets — those outside our solar system — than about the people who make the search for them their lives' cause.

CARTHAGE, by Joyce Carol Oates. (Ecco/HarperCol-

lins, \$15.99.) Resonant with classically tragic overtones, Oates's novel delves into the troubled psyche of an Iraq war veteran. When the town of Carthage, in upstate New York, joins a father's search for his missing 19-year-old daughter, they discover an unlikely suspect: Brett Kincaid, a high school football star turned war hero.

THE MEN WHO UNITED THE STATES: America's Explorers, Inventors, Eccentrics, and Mavericks, and the Creation of One Nation, Indivisible, by Simon Winchester. (Harper Perennial, \$16.99.) Mixing popular history with contemporary travelogue, Winchester follows the footsteps of those who have left their mark on America's landscapes — from Lewis and Clark to the builders of the transcontinental railroad and the great highway systems.
